THIS MONTH'S MEETING

OpenOffice, Thunderbird and Firefox

Tonight, **Jim Greenfield** will demonstrate an alternate system to Word, Excel, PowerPoint etc by using a FREE program called **Open Office**.

Open Office contains many features very similar to Word and Excel etc and tonight, in addition to Open Office, we will take a look at alternate email and Web browser programs called **Thunderbird** and **Firefox**.



Thunderbird and **Firefox** are alternate programs to the Microsoft web browser, Internet Explorer (and others) and Thunderbird is also an alternative to Live Mail, Outlook, Outlook Express etc.

All things working well, **Trevor Francis** will download and install Thunderbird and Firefox onto a club computer and demonstrate how they can be used. Besides OpenOffice, both Thunderbird and Firefox are FREE Open Source programs and if one wishes to distance oneself from Microsoft, then the combination of the above three programs can be very useful.



Many people still use Internet Explorer as their web browser but Internet Explorer can now be seen to be less secure to virus and hacking than Firefox which has more security.

Security Risk on Public Wi-Fi.

Australians are risking their bank accounts by using public wi-fi hotspots, which can be hacked with little more than a radio receiver or a brief online tutorial, technology experts caution.



Safety tips for Wi-Fi hotspots:

- Never use websites or apps that require a username or password.
- Do not use banking or financial services.
- Assess whether the hotspot is operated by a reliable source.
- Use a VPN (virtual private network) app to encrypt data transfers.
- Turn off all sharing services, such as Airdrop.

John Kirby then took the floor and talked about the progression of NBN rollout. Some of his points:

Broadband is the ability to link the home to internet via NBN, ADSL and Cable.

NBN is expensive with limited availability. Fibre to home has very high speed; fibre to node has high speed.

ADSL - Assymetric Digital Subscriber

- Speed not symmetrical
- Uses existing phone
- Works by transmitting data at very high frequencies
- Can use internet and phone at same time.

Cable

- Uses co-axial cable
- Speeds vary per provider
- Was typically hung from stobie pole to stobie pole

3G (Third Generation)

- Global system for mobile communication
- License fees for carriers was expensive
- Voice and Internet network
- Uses GPS technology



Telstra's help desk

March meeting, con't.

4G (most of Adelaide has 4G)

- Allows more data transfer
- Reduces latency and interference

5G (due around 2020)

- More towers needed so coverage areas improve
- Signal efficiency enhanced

WiMax


- Initially through Adam
- Required where no fibre or ADSL (similar service to ADSL)

NBN Satellite

- Designed to support rural areas
- Not available to new clients until July 2016
- Can connect from almost anywhere in Australia


Major components for Home networking

- Modem/router. Ethernet Cable. WiFi Repeaters
- Power over home's electrical service (EoP).
- Ensure you get AC version



Powerline Adapters (EoP)

- Use existing electrical cable
- Must be on same circuit
- Filters out noisy signals
- Converts data into radio waves
- Surge protectors can be a problem
- Avoid using with phone charge outlet




Easy Install

Voice Over IP (VoIP)

- Voice converted into stream of data in a call via the internet
- Call will remain on the internet for the duration
- Requires a modem/router and is easy to set up
- Skype is a VoIP

WHY DO WE HAVE LEAP YEARS? —

Leap years are needed to keep our modern day GREGORIAN CALENDAR in alignment with the Earth's revolutions around the sun. It takes the Earth approximately 365.242199 days - or 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 46 seconds - to circle once around the Sun. This is called a tropical year.

However, the Gregorian calendar has only 365 days in a year so, if we didn't add a day on February 29 nearly every 4 years, we would lose almost 6 hours off our calendar every year. After only 100 years, our calendar would be off by approximately 24 days!





8 KEYBOARD SHORTCUTS **WHEN SURFING THE WEB**

If you enjoy surfing the web then these nifty shortcuts will speed up your process. Remember to hold down the first key (such as CTRL, ALT, Command) and then the following key simultaneously.

Open a new tab on your webpage – (tabbed pages are a great feature in letting you open multiple web pages in one window.)

To launch a new tab, press:

PC: CTRL + T

Mac: Command + T

Open a new window - to open a completely new window, just press:

PC: CTRL + N

Mac: Command + N

Quick access to the address bar - The URL bar is where you type in the website address. Don't bother reaching for the mouse with these shortcuts:

PC: ALT + D

Mac: Command + L

Favourite / bookmark a page - An amazing feature so you can quickly return to an interesting article or page.

PC: CTRL + D

Mac: Command + D

Close a tab page - Stop searching for the little X to close your page. This shortcut will only close your current tab page and not the whole browser.

PC: CTRL + F4 or CTRL + W

Mac: Command + W

Refresh your webpage - If your page hasn't loaded correctly or you just want to see the latest updates on your Facebook page, refreshing your page will bring the most up to date version.

PC: F5 or CTRL + R

Mac: Command + R

Find a keyword - You are searching for something specific and don't want to read through all the unnecessary text. This feature will bring up a box to type the word or phrase you want.

PC: CTRL + F

Mac: Command + F

Reopen previous tab in browser - Have you ever accidentally closed the tab you were browsing and can't remember where you found it? This shortcut will solve the problem opening up the last tab you closed.

PC: CTRL + Shift + T

Mac: Command + Shift + T

GOOGLE CHROME

If you are using Google's Chrome browser with either Windows XP or Windows Vista, you have probably already received a message advising that Chrome will not support either XP or Vista after April 2016. Chrome is still likely to work, but will not receive any fixes to resolve problems that arise. Consider moving to Firefox before the end of April 2016.

Reminder that XP is not supported by Microsoft and Vista's support will finish in April 2017.

ANTIVIRUS PROGRAM TESTED

AV Comparatives publishes a 127 page report analysing 21 antivirus programs. **Product of the year** - Kaspersky Labs and Bitdefender tied for this award.

Norton Security won best protection for 2015 while Bitdefender and Kaspersky tied for lowest impact on performance.

WHAT IS OSCOBO?

A new search engine that aims to keep your personal data personal. It claims to not store any users' data and not track users across the web.

Nor make money from selling such profiles. The site was launched in London in January and is looking to expand into Europe.

Most people are aware Google uses your personal data, search history etc.

DuckDuckGo is also a search engine that doesn't track you, and its claimed usage has grown by 600% over the last 2 years since the Snowden leaks and the extent of the NSA surveillance fiasco.

The WhatsApp scam

Millions of WhatsApp users are being warned about a scam email circulating on the popular app that will install a virus on phones.



Cybercriminals have designed a WhatsApp specific virus that affects both iPhones and Android devices. The scam comes in the form of an email and looks like a legitimate source. If you open the email though, a virus will infiltrate your phone.

Don't fall for sneaky subject lines like "new voice message", "an audio memo was missed", "a brief audio recording has been delivered" and "a short vocal recording was obtained".



If you use WhatsApp, remember that all voice memos, audio memos, recordings and notifications will be received in the app only.

"Cybercriminals are becoming more and more like marketers, trying to use creative subject lines to have unsuspecting emails be clicked and opened to spread malware".


