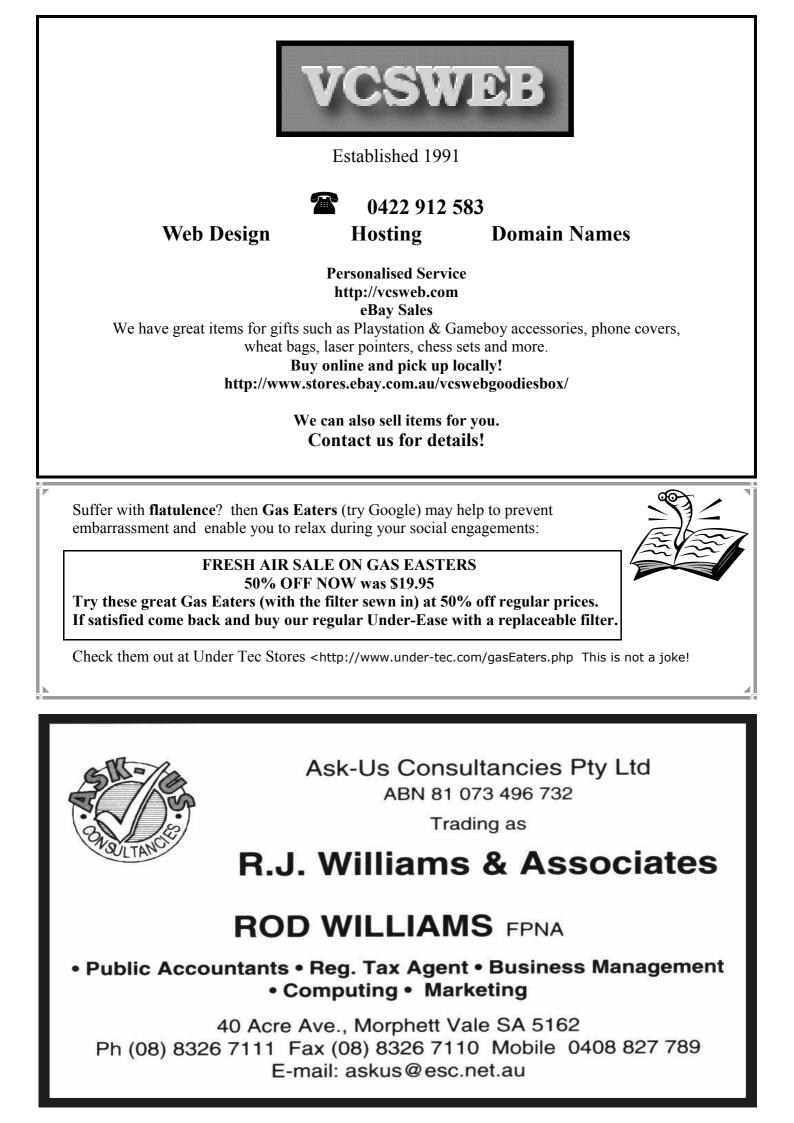
Windows XP Automatic Shutdown and Re-Booting

The Microsoft Operating systems, like XP are so comprehensive and frequently complex that I despair of ever being anything other than an above average "dabbler". Many times I come across a problem that I may have encountered before but can never remember the cure. For me, writing things down has been too tedious. I can muddle my way through, sometimes finding the right answer by perseverance or good luck. I recently had a friend tell me about a problem with her PC shutting down and restarting, all by itself. I remembered that XP has a built-in security system that in the event of a major failure, will shut itself down and re-boot. If this happens frequently, it would be good to know what is the reason. Turning off this Automatic feature will allow you to read any error message, giving you some chance of finding out the problem that caused the error. A search of the Knowledge base gave the information how to turn the auto-shutdown off and as a consequence allowed the error message to be read, (*Control Panel/System/Advanced Tab*; *Startup and Recovery*). A further search of the Knowledge Base using the Error Message as a search string bought up 184 articles describing the possible cause. Most indicated a probable Memory Module defect. Now all she has to do is determine which one. [http://search.support.microsoft.com/search/default.aspx]

Getting to know how to use the Knowledge Base is a good skill to master, CC,

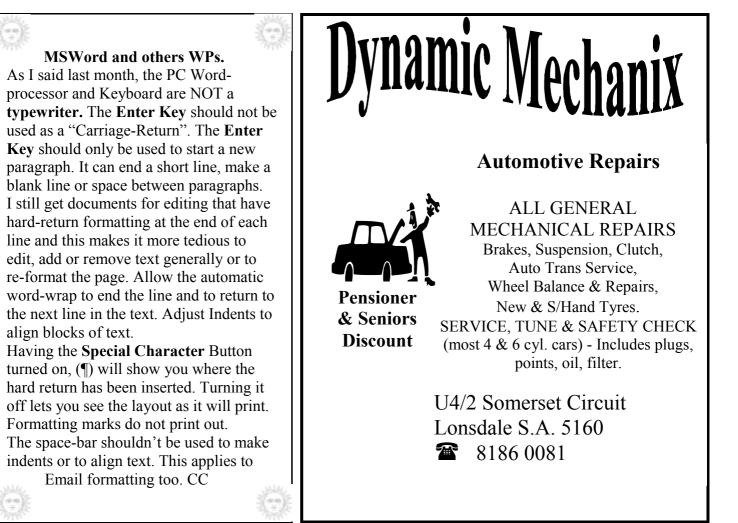

Windows XP TOOL BOX Practical hints for the serious Tinkerer



Change the location of the "My Documents" Folder

When XP is loaded, the default location for the My documents is on the C:\ drive and there is a "My Documents Folder" for each user designated during set-up. It is possible to change the location, this might be useful if the hard drive has been partitioned and you want to save data on the second partition as a security move. **Microsoft** details the way to do this in the **Knowledge Base Article 310147**. To change the location:

- 1. Click Start, point to My Documents
- 2. Right click My Documents, then click Properties
- 3. Click on the Target tab
- 4. In the **Target** box, click **Move**, click the drive/folder in which to store your documents and then OK twice.
- 5. In the Move Documents Box, click Yes to move your documents to the new location.

If you change your mind later, you can restore the **My Documents Folder** to its default location. You can also remove **My Documents** from the **Start** Menu, this may be a security advantage, (keep prying eyes away!). *Start/Properties/Customise/Advanced*; In the Start menu items list, under **My Documents**, click "**Don't Display this item**". At the next restart, **My Documents** will not be seen!

Microsoft Word, other word processors and text programs

PAGE SIZES: Word processors look after a fair bit of the page layout and formatting all by them selves. There are several format variations that can be saved in a customised template and/or regularly used document that can be saved as a template. The *Normal.dot* is the standard MSWord document that opens every-time you open a new blank document. By default, the page will be sized to Microsoft's American English standard. If the language has not been changed when Windows and/or the WP were installed, **US-English** will be used to auto-edit, spell, grammar check and to size the page.

The US English standard uses the LETTER size page, 8.5 x 11 inches. Australian standard is to us the International A4 standard which is 210 x 297 mm. Most of you buy A4 paper packs for the printer, so make sure that the page setup is for A4 size. (File/Page Setup; Paper Size tab). Note that here you can also change the borders, header and footnote size and margins. Make sure also, that your printer is set to a print size of A4. Usually set in the printer control panel. You might also want to reset the XP system language to Australian English through the Language toolbar, (down next to the system tray).

Safe Mode

When and why to use the Safe Mode when starting your computer:

Safe Mode is used to start your computer if for some reason you are unable to start in the normal Windows. It may also be used when you do Scan Disk and/or Disk Defragmenter as it automatically turns off all running programs.

In safe mode, Windows uses default setting (VGA monitor, no network, Microsoft mouse drive, and the minimum device drivers required to start Windows). You may not have access to CD-ROM drives, printers, or other devices.

When there is major trouble with your computer, a technician may start your computer in the safe mode to first try to rectify the problem. From the safe mode a technician can change settings as needed.

To start Windows in safe mode:

From the task bar left click the Start button, then left click Shut Down.

From the "Shut Down Windows" box, select and left click the "Restart" command, and then left click the "OK" button.

Press and hold down the F8 key (located at the top of the keyboard) until Microsoft Windows Startup Menu appears. (For some computers, you can use the CTRL key instead of the F8 key.)

Enter the number for Safe Mode (normally number 3), and then press Enter on the keyboard.

Once you have pressed Enter, it may take some minutes for your computer to restart in the Safe Mode. When restarted in Safe Mode you will see a "Desktop" box. Read the information and then left click "OK". (Note the words "Safe mode" at each corner of your monitor).

From this point on you can use your computer, but as previously stated you may not be able to use a printer, CD ROM, scanners etc. But, Safe Mode is the time to run Scan Disk and Disk Defragmenter as all other programs have been turned off.

After you have finished running the computer in Safe Mode, you need to restart your computer before Windows will start properly. Once restarted you will be able to use your printer, scanners etc. as normal.

Exercise:

Restart the computer in "Safe Mode" as per instructions, run "Disk Defragmenter" and then restart the computer to run in the normal Windows
