Last month's meeting - Excel & ChromeCast

We had a very good turnout again last month with 3 visitors, Mary, Hazel & Robert.

John Kirby was wished a very happy birthday.

Cheryl McDonald gave us a talk on the basic uses of Excel and how she utilises this program into her everyday life. Some pointers made were:

- ① Excel is made up of workbooks, sheets and cells.
- ⑤ She showed us how to:
 - Widen columns
 - Format cells
 - Merge cells
 - Create a diary
 - Insert graphs



① Cheryl demonstrated how she uses Excel for holidays, eg planning expenditure, cost of fuel and kms per litre used and cost of caravan parks per night.

Lindsay Chuck then talked about ChromeCast

This is a wireless display adapter which displays on your TV screen what is being shown on the screen of your smartphone, tablet/android or PC.

- Been available in US for a year and in the UK for a shorter time.
- Not the same as Apple TV or Western Digital TV live streaming media players.
- Apps/programs YouTube, Google Play movies & TV, Plex Pocket Casts, Ezyflix TV video streaming and Pandora.

Last month's meeting, cont'd

- Three steps to setup :
 - Plug dongle into HDMI port on TV
 - 2. Plug power cord into dongle and power point
 - 3. Download Chromecast app onto your smartphone / tablet / PC and follow the wizard to connect to your WiFi network

Lindsay found he could display photos in his Cloud storage (OneDrive) on his TV, display his calendar app, skype and any app on his tablet. The TV is like a big monitor.

ChromeCast is available at JB HiFi for around \$49.

A word of caution - it uses data!

As there have been reports of problems, ensure you know the store's refund policy before purchasing this device.



OUR JULY COURSES

We had a successful time during July with running both a Computing Basics 1 Course as well as a Microsoft Word Course. The photo was taken at the Word Course.

The **Computer Basics 1 Course** was held for 3 participants and we were able to provide individual instruction to each student. This was a 3 week, 6 hour course covering areas on how to look after your computer (and yourself at the same time) and structuring files and folders in an easy to use format. Besides this group participation, we also covered specific areas and tasks that folk wished to be more familiar with.

The Microsoft Word Course was a 2 week, 4 hour Course held for 6 people.



The course ranged from the basic layout of the Word 2007 ribbon to working with tabs and indents to more advanced techniques of managing tables, working with photos and texts.

We hope that people enjoyed the challenge of looking more closely at some of Word's capabilities.

TONIGHT'S MEETING - RESTORING OLD PHOTOS

Scanning Photos

Getting a good digital image of an old photo is a bit of an art.

- Use the scanner to scan, not to tweak
- Scan the photos at high resolution, in an uncompressed format
- Always scan in colour, even with black and white photos
- If possible crop your photo when scanning

Tips for better results

- Use a tripod.
- Use a backing of white paper or poster board
- Turn off the flash.
- Shoot in colour.
- Shoot in as high a resolution setting as feasible
- If you need to tweak the image, do it afterwards, in a digital image software application like Photoshop.

Trevor and June will then show us how to restore old photographs using Adobe Photoshop.

BRAINS OF THE ELDERLY

Older people do not decline mentally with age, it just takes them longer to recall facts because they have more information in their brains, scientists believe.

Much like a computer struggles as the hard drive gets full up, so too do humans take longer to access information, it has been suggested.

Researchers say this slowing down is not the same as cognitive decline.

"The human brain works slower in old age," said Dr Michael Ramscar, "but only because we have stored more information over time."

"The brains of older people do not get weak. On the contrary, they simply know more".

Recipe Corner

Easy chocolate cake / dessert

- 2. ½ cup cream
- 3. 2 tsp brandy
- 4. 1 tbs honey



WHY DOES REBOOTING A COMPUTER FIX SO MANY PROBLEMS?

I had a call from a friend last week. " Jim, I am having problems with my computer". My response "have you tried rebooting it?" This seems like a flippant response but rebooting a computer can actually solve many problems.

So what's going on here? Why does resetting a device or restarting a program fix so many problems? And why not try to identify and fix problems rather than use the blunt hammer of "reset it"?

Bear in mind that this solution isn't just limited to Windows computers, but applies to all types of computing devices. You will find the advice "try resetting it" applied to wireless routers, iPads, Android phones and more. This same advice even applies to software - is Firefox acting slow and consuming a lot of memory? Try closing and reopening it!

Some problems require a restart

To illustrate why rebooting can fix so many problems, let's take a look at the ultimate software problem a Windows computer can face: Windows halts, showing a <u>blue screen of death</u>. The blue screen was caused by a low-level error, likely a problem with a hardware driver or malfunction. Windows reaches a state where it doesn't know how to recover, so it halts, shows a blue-screen of death, gathers information about the problem, and automatically restarts the computer for you. This restart fixes the blue screen of death.

Windows has gotten better at dealing with errors - for example, if your graphics driver crashes, Windows **XP** would have frozen. In Windows **Vista** and newer versions, the Windows desktop will lose its fancy graphical effects for a few moments before regaining them. Behind the scenes, Windows is restarting the malfunctioning graphics driver.

What is Spam / Junk Mail?

Spam/Junk mail refers to unsolicited email that you don't want. The most obvious examples of spam are unsolicited *commercial* emails such as ads for porn, drugs or body enhancement products.



There are two significant qualifications to spam:

- You didn't ask for it. An email that offers college degrees or cheaper mortgages from a person or a business that you have never communicated with would probably qualify as spam.
- You don't want it. When you receive it, you are likely to delete it unread based on the subject line.

Spam is tricky. Some email programs will automatically filter spam based on common key words, the number of people the message is being sent to, or the sender's reputation. Some also allow you to flag messages as spam.

Unfortunately, *any* email that people don't want runs the risk of being marked as spam. If an email newsletter that you signed up for that changes its focus into something you don't want, it might legitimately be considered spam.

If you wish to block these unwanted emails in the future, it is recommended to send their domain to your blocked list by **right clicking the unwanted email**, click '*junk email*', then click on the '*add senders domain to blocked senders list*'.


