THE USE OF ELECTRONIC TABLETS

Last year when Linda and I went touring several European countries, we normally had access to a computer within the hotel's business area. The problem with this was that the keyboard layout and language was often different, particularly the "@" symbol location. This year before heading off to a UK tour, we purchased an ASUS Transformer tablet running an Android 4 operating system to enable communications, as most hotels that we were staying at had wi-fi available. This particular 10" screen model has a keyboard that can be removed if required and whilst the screen is connected to the keyboard the tablet has up to 14 hours of battery life, very useful when away. This unit did not need a physical protection case, as the keyboard folds like a light weight laptop and is a good form of protection in its own right.

Originally we thought that we could use our 3rd Nortons 360 licence, but because this is an Android operating system it requires a different virus protection application designed for Android. Applications for Android can be located at "Google Play Store" (https://play.google.com/apps).

We looked at what our priorities were, (1) emailing the family and friends, (2) we are lawn bowls coaches, so the ability to record by video the bowling delivery action was important, (3) the quality of taking still photos and at the time the ASUS had the highest resolution of all the tablets that we looked at, (4) for those who like games and puzzles, this is a good medium to use. We did not want to pay the extra for 3G wireless access as we now have a wireless modem at home, so the wi-fi model was sufficient for us.

By buying the tablet just before travelling (less than 30 days) we handed the receipt over and showed the unit to the Tourist Refund Scheme" office within the international section of the airport and the GST was returned to our bank

account within the next week. We had loaded the tablet with a large number of photos to show to relatives when in UK.

This proved a great means of communication as there was a family health problem whilst away and we could keep in touch. Linda and I do not need to fight over our laptop now

as she can access her email via the tablet while I am working on the laptop.

The bottom line is what do you require a tablet to do for you, and then you can work out the best unit that serves your purpose.

Lindsay will be talking about e-tablets at the January meeting.

Recipe Corner





CHOCOLATE CHUNK CHRISTMAS BISCUITS

250g Butter, softened

2½ cups (440g) Brown Sugar

1 Tablespoon Vanilla extract

2 Eggs

3 Cups (450g) Plain Flour, sifted

1 teaspoon Baking Powder

80g each of Dark, White and Milk Chocolate, chopped.

Method:

Preheat oven to 180° C. Place butter, sugar and vanilla in the bowl of an electric mixer and beat for 8—10 minutes or until pale and creamy. Gradually add the eggs, beating well after each addition. Add flour and baking powder and beat until a smooth dough forms. Mix chocolate through using a wooden spoon.

Roll 1½ tablespoons of dough at a time, into balls and place on baking trays lined with non-stick baking paper, leaving room to spread. Flatten gently and bake for 10 minutes. Allow to cool on trays. Makes 12.

* Paper CD cases with a clear window fit a large biscuit perfectly. Line with nonstick baking paper (or wrap carefully in Gladwrap) so the biscuit doesn't leave a mark, tie with festive ribbon and attach a gift card or Christmas sticker.

MINI CHRISTMAS PUDDINGS

1½ cups (240g) Currants

1½ cups (225g) Raisins, chopped

1½ cups (240g) Sultanas

1/3 cup (55g) finely chopped Mixed Peel

½ cup (60ml) Rum for Brandy

250g Butter, at room temperature

1¹/₄ cups (275g) Brown Sugar

Grated rind of 1 Orange

Grated rind of 1 Lemon

4 Eggs

1 cup (150g) Plain Flour

1 teaspoon Baking Powder


½ teaspoon Mixed Spice

½ teaspoon Ground Ginger

½ teaspoon Ground Cinnamon

2 cups (140g) fresh Breadcrumbs

Custard &/or Ice-cream to serve



Method:

- 1. Combine fruit and rum or brandy in a bowl. Cover and set aside overnight.
- 2. Grease Muffin tins (or small individual over-proof dishes) line the bases with a small circle of baking paper. Cream butter, sugar and rinds together until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in fruit. Fold in flour sifted with baking powder, spices and ½ teaspoon salt. Fold in breadcrumbs.
- 3. Preheat oven to 160°C.
- 4. Spoon into tins or dishes. The mixture will only rise a little, so work out what size puddings you want, and fill accordingly. Cover with a circle of baking paper. Place muffin tin or dishes in a large baking dish and pour in enough boiling water to come halfway up the sides of the tins. Tightly cover the whole baking dish with foil and bake for 1½ to 2 hours until the puddings are firm to touch.
- 5. Remove from baking dish and cool for 5 mins before turning out.
- 6. Reheat in a microwave on medium for approx 30 seconds per pudding, depending on individual microwaves.
- 7. Serve with Brandy Custard, cream, icecream, or all three!!




