8 SIGNS YOU HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO HACKERS

he internet has become so ingrained into our day to day living, we don't fully appreciate the risks involved. According to OverSixty, we need to be aware of the fact that hackers still represent a huge security threat.

- 1. You are receiving fake antivirus messages While not nearly as prevalent as they used to be, fake antivirus warning is a sign your system has been compromised. By the time the fake message appears, the damage has often already been done.
- 2. Unwanted browser toolbars If you have noticed your browser now has multiple toolbars that you haven't installed, that's probably not a good thing. Names may seem to indicate legitimate sources, but unless you have installed the additional toolbars yourself, you may have been exposed to malicious computer hackers.
- 3. Redirected internet searches Hackers make a living out of redirecting people's browsers to places they don't want to go. Usually these redirected internet searches are well hidden from users from additional proxies, but if you type common words into most search engines and scan the results, you should know if something is up.
- most obvious (and annoying) sign that your computer has been exposed. If you are getting random browser popups that websites don't normally generate, then your system has been compromised.
- 5. Friends receive fake emails While this form of hacker attack is by no means as popular as it used to be, malware programs and hackers can still pull email addresses and contact lists from social media sites. Often the bogus emails won't have your address as the sender, but they may use your name.
 - 6. On-line passwords suddenly change Obviously, if your password changed and you don't remember doing it, this is a cause for concern. Often this happens when someone has responded to an authentic looking phish mail that collects login information.
 - 7. Unexpected software installs Most malware programs these days like Trojan viruses, and worms typically install themselves the same way as legitimate programs. So if you have noticed some unexpected software appearing in your Download folder, then you are in a bit of strife.
 - 8. Mouse pointer moves itself While it may look like your computer has suddenly become possessed by a poltergeist; if your computer mouse pointer is moving on its own volution, there could be some hackers at play. Hackers have been known to log into idle computers, break into your bank account and steal your money,.

This Month's meeting - Cloud Storage

Our January meeting will look at Cloud Storage. What it is, how it can be used, and in particular, how the presenter uses it.

Terms associated with Cloud Storage include: Google Drive, One Drive, iCloud, Dropbox, sharing, syncing, backup, photos, music, documents and settings.

You probably already know about Cloud Storage, certainly if you have a tablet or smart phone, you may already be using it. For instance, have you turned on backup in the settings area of your tablet or smart phone? Are you accessing data across your different devices?

Tip: know the amount of Cloud Storage you have and monitor the usage of it.

In addition to the above terms, the type of apps you use can save you valuable space on your smart phone/tablet and/or computer. I will comment on an app named Pocket during the presentation that uses the Cloud.

Cloud storage can be free depending on how much storage you use.

Tip: Consider how you use your tablet/smart phone, and have a plan for backing up and storing your data

As an example, I assisted a user who used their tablet to take photos and videos while on holiday. The experience used most of their tablet storage resulting in an urgent need to free up disk space.

Using multiple storage options is a consideration, and if you have an iPad, you can use storage other than iCloud. Consider Google Drive, Dropbox or one of the other many cloud options.

Tip: know where your data is stored and how to access it.

In conclusion, Cloud storage may not be the option for you, however, when considering your backup or storage strategy, it is an option that should not be ruled out.

The benefits and accessibility of the cloud while using your tablet or smart phone for photos while on holiday may mean the difference between having photos and not having photos, especially if your phone/tablet is lost or stolen.

SAFE BROWSING FOR ANDROID DEVICES

oogle is looking to keep people safer by enabling safe browsing by default for Android devices. The main aim is to prevent users visiting malware infected websites.

The feature has been available in its desktop browser and could be turned on when users switched on Google's optional data compression service.

Good news if you have an android device.

CORTANA

As you know, Cortana is Microsoft's answer to Apple's Siri and is now available for iOS and Android phones. Microsoft have released Cortana as a free app.

WHAT APPS DRAIN YOUR ANDROID BATTERY?

AVG technologies has released a report on apps that drain your battery and also use your data and storage. For Android smart phones and tablets, this is an interesting list.

The apps - Kakao talk, WhatsApp, Facebook and Instagram. In addition, watch out for Wechat which starts consuming resources as soon as your device is turned on. Microsoft Outlook has made it into the top 10 resource drainers. Clash of Clans is a battery draining game while My Talking Tom Free and My Talking Angela Free drain resources too.

If your device is running out of battery or data, you can turn off notifications and data



consuming functions so it will last a little longer.

AVAST FREE ANTIVIRUS 2016

We normally suggest Avast when we get asked about a free antivirus program so it was interesting reading about the 2016 release of this program. Offers an included password manager which generates strong passwords, stores and fills them locally, syncing with free iOS and Android apps. Network security scanner detects more router vulnerabilities and displays details. Scanning allows you to review results and fix what the program has found.


