## Our last meeting — e-tablets

We had a slightly smaller crowd, must have been the weather which was not the best—rain and wind and quite cold!

Jim talked briefly about a **Word 2007—2010 Course** and offered a pamphlet to anyone who would be interested in attending.

John Kirby gave a demonstration on his experience with **e-tablets**. As some of us have tablets and others are looking to purchase one, this talk was very informative.

Some points made:

- Clarify your requirements : Laptop vs Tablet.

- Computer Games.

- Can get apps localised to Adelaide area.

- Free to save photos / files over internet via Dropbox, Skydrive, Google.

- Advantages of tablet:

- ◆ Most connect to wi-fi: 3G network can be purchased.
- ◆ Can communicate via emails, skype and other multimedia.
- ◆ Can play games and use as an e-reader.
- ◆ Inbuilt still and video camera.
- ◆ Lightweight.
- ◆ **Apple** tests all apps before they are made available to the public.
- ◆ Battery life up to 10 hours.

- Disadvantages of tablet:

- ◆ Non standard operating system.
- ◆ Normal software does not work (eg Word needs to be downloaded).
- ◆ Not designed as a hard worker.
- ◆ Screen must be cleaned regularly, (a member uses a stylus instead of her finger).
- ◆ Need to add a case or screed protector.
- ◆ Expensive to repair.
- ◆ No hard drive backup—only done via Cloud

- John then connected his tablet to the club wi-fi and gave a demonstration using internet..



## Why you should NOT have more than one antivirus : (same thing applies to firewalls)

Most people know they should only have one but do they know why?

Having more than one Anti-Virus would catch more viruses – right?

No, WRONG! Antivirus programs clash with each other.

AV programs work at a low level whereas other programs run at high level.

It is ok to have multiple instances of, lets say, web browsers as they just connect to the net then close down completely when you are finished surfing and they operate on the higher level.

So what actually happens is, when you have two programs working at low level, they trip over each other causing program crashes and system lockups.

Most antivirus programs operate in two modes:

**Scan Mode:** the program examines the memory and files on your hard disk for traces of malware. This involves examining the contents of each file for traces that 'look like' viruses.

**Monitor Mode:** usually called or referred to as 'real time monitoring', the program runs constantly, scanning files as they are downloaded to your machine, notifying you if the file you just received contains something that appears to be a virus.

It's ok to scan with a different antivirus program than your normal resident scanner as all that happens is the program will scan, report its findings, then it will close down.

Online scanners are good for second opinions. But if you install a second Anti-Virus program, it will (or should) inform you that another antivirus program has been detected and to uninstall it.

If you choose to ignore this warning it will then install its own 'real time monitors' and that is when the problems will start – lockups, poor performance and crashes.



# BIB AND BUB

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF AUSTRALIA'S GUMNUT BABIES.

Although they colonised a land rich in native legend and lore, homesick new settlers carried with them to Australia, among other comforts of home, their own creatures of fantasy. All the denizens of British nursery tales – Irish leprechauns, Welsh kelpies, Scots brownies, and English pixies, fairies and goblins – were standard fare for white Australian children for over a century.

When Australian fairy books began to appear, native animals of the gentler sort were seen to mingle with the familiar rabbits, and the prettiest wildflowers clustered with the daisies in dim woods and on grassy hills. Elegant, well-dressed European fairies settled into their adopted home. But the grey-green bush, with its ragged scribbly-bark gums and small, dry flowers, its brown creeks and rough bush tracks, continued to hold its own secrets.

One woman changed all that.

At much the same time as Beatrix Potter and Kenneth Grahame were sharing their observations of the English countryside and giving character to the animals of field and hedgerow, May Gibbs, a young artist on the other side of the world was looking at Australian animals and seeing their potential as story characters. Her creation was the bush world of the gumnuts Snugglepoot and Cuddlepoot, their cousins **Bib & Bub** and a host of other gumnut and other wildflower babies: a world of scribbly writing, koalas, possums, bull ants and beetles, kind old lizards, evil snakes and the horribly wicked, uncouth and cruel Banksia Men. Those little plump bare-bottomed figures with their gumnut hats or ragged-blossom skirts and their wide blue eyes became national symbols as early as 1913.

'**Bib and Bub**', was first published in August 1925 adopting the European comic-strip format.



May Gibbs was born Cecelia May Gibbs in Cheam Fields, Surrey on 17<sup>th</sup> January 1877. Her father Herbert and uncle sailed to Australia, landing in Port Adelaide in June 1881. They paid for and secured 1220 hectares of land which had been selected for them, and the next day sailed to Wallaroo on Spencer Gulf, taking with them only what they could carry. The rest of their luggage was to follow by a small ketch in a few weeks. On reaching Wallaroo they engaged a fisherman and his son to take them across the 72 kilometres to Franklin Harbour and then 10 kilometres up the harbour. Herbert's wife Cecelia, along with her 3 children, May, older brother and baby born at sea, arrived in November 1881 and made their way to join Herbert and begin farming. Unfortunately the venture failed, mainly due to drought.. Their story is quite amazing.

This was the first of several properties where May lived with her family as a child – Norwood and Auburn in South Australia, then near Collie and in Perth in WA. May, a talented artist and author of many books, cartoons and short stories that she illustrated, quietly married J O Kelly in a registry office in Perth, Easter 1919. They moved to Sydney, and lived at several addresses around the harbour. In 1925, with their two Scotty dogs, Jamie & Peter, the Kellys took up residence at 'Nutcote' in Neutral Bay.

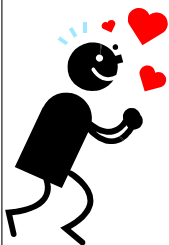
For over 50 years May Gibbs entertained the children of Australia. May died 27<sup>th</sup> November, 1969, age 92.

What have you stepped in to smell this way.*



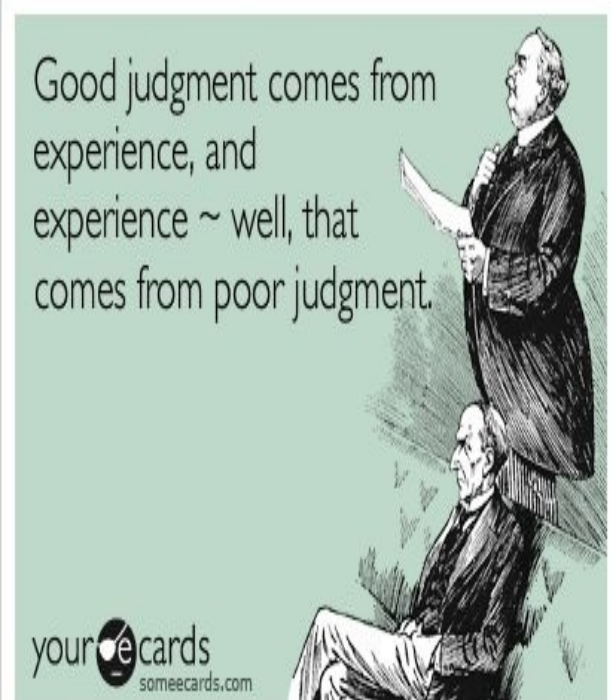

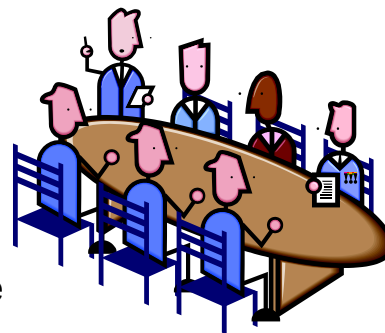

# Recipe Corner

## QUEENS PUDDING

### INGREDIENTS:

4 slices of bread, crusts removed and cubed

2 eggs at room temperature, separated

300 mls milk

1 teaspoon vanilla essence

1 Tablespoon sugar

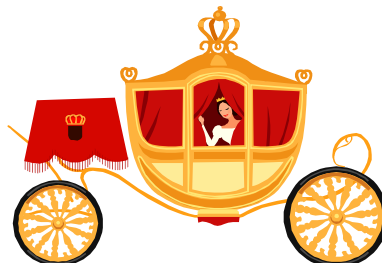
3 Tablespoons raspberry jam

2 Tablespoons caster sugar

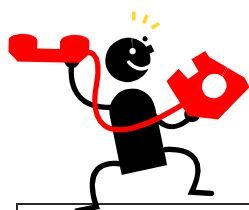


### METHOD:

1. Microwave milk for approx 1 minute and beat with the egg yolks.
2. Mix bread cubes, essence and sugar with the milk mixture and pour into a lightly greased ovenproof dish. Stand in a baking dish of water.
3. Bake at 180° for 30 to 45 minutes.
4. Spread the jam on the pudding.
5. Whisk the egg whites until stiff and fold in caster sugar. Spread over the jam.
6. Return to oven for 10 to 15 minutes until the meringue is slightly golden and crisp.

Having an eHealth record means your important health information is available online as you need it, day or night.

It also means that the doctors, nurses and other health professionals involved in your care have the information they need to make the best possible decisions about your health—no matter when or where you may need treatment.

An eHealth record provides peace of mind and means not having to remember every detail of your medications or tests when you visit a doctor, particularly one you have not seen before.

Most importantly, it is safe and secure and can be set up so you can have a trusted person, like a family member or carer, help you manage your record, if you wish.

The Australian Government's eHealth record was launched in July 2012 and people can now create their own record.

As more people register and healthcare professionals join the system, the better connected Australia's health and hospital system will become.

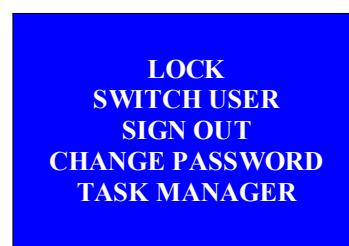
The password check is one step I could do without.

Fortunately, there is a way to bypass it. Here's how:

Select: "Ctrl + Alt + Del"


The following box will appear on a blue background.

Select: "CHANGE PASSWORD"



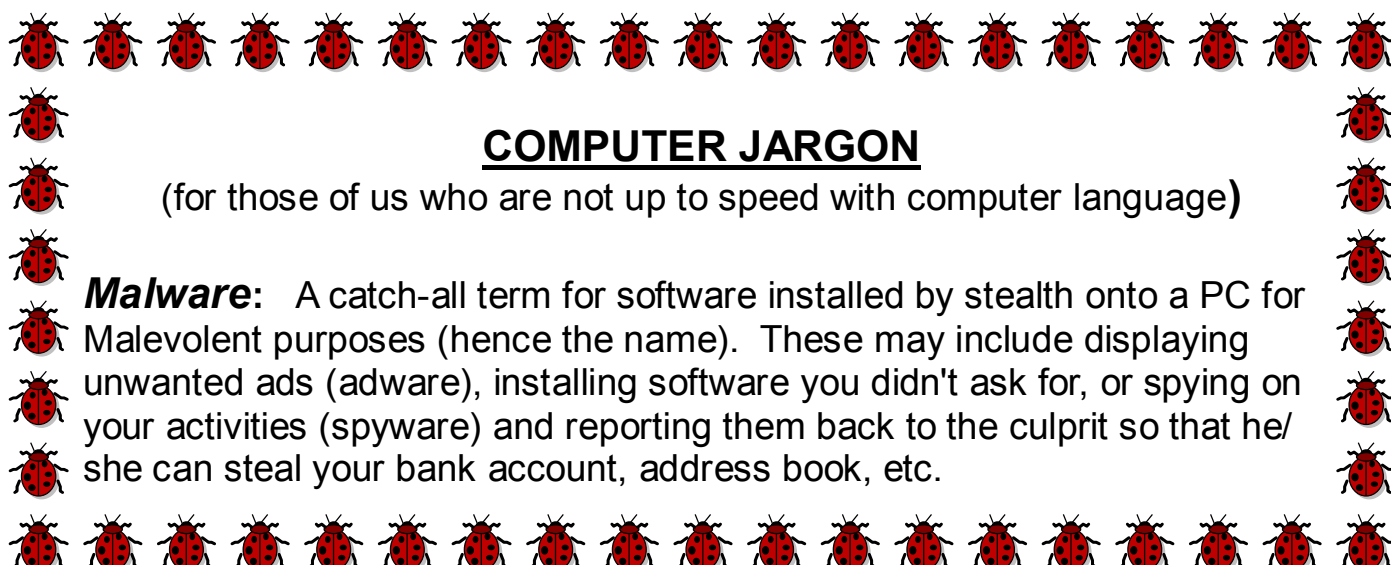
The following box will appear, also on a blue background.

Fill in as per request, but this time leave the "New Password" and "Confirm New Password" blank.
