TIPS

Computer email Info!

Very useful when trying to read small print (especially in the early hours). If you hold down the Ctrl key on your key board and then turn the small wheel in the middle of your mouse away from you or towards you, the print size will change - it will either get larger or smaller - depending on which way you turn the wheel.

Lost the Volume control icon?

How to get back the little speaker icon that used to be in the bottom right corner of the screen (the system tray).

They never seem to know how it disappeared, but you can bet it was an over-zealous mouse drag by one of the kids or something like that. To get it back:

From the Start menu, go to Control Panel

In Windows XP:

Choose Sounds and Audio Devices,

(if you're in Category View, open Sounds, Speech, and Audio Devices first)

On the Volume tab, tick the box: Place volume icon in the taskbar.

In Windows 2000 and Me:

Double-click Sounds and Multimedia:

On the Sounds tab, tick the box: Show volume control on the taskbar.

In Windows 98:

Double-click Multimedia,

On the Audio tab, tick the box: Show volume control on the taskbar.

Then click OK, and the speaker icon will reappear in the system tray!

nb: Double click it to get to the advanced options.

nb2: If the icon still doesn't appear, take the tick out of the 'show on taskbar' box, click Apply, tick the box again and click Apply again.

OUTLOOK EXPRESS, Security and housekeeping tips

Preview Pane: if you use the default setting that includes the preview pane under the messages list in your Inbox, there is a risk of some virus or Spyware infection. Turn it off:

- Open Outlook Express, (offline ok)
- Left click on the "View" tab above the toolbar
- From the drop-down menu, choose "Layout"
- On the Layout Panel, untick the box "show preview pane"
- · Click on the "Apply" button and then OK
- Close Layout panel, preview message will not be downloaded and displayed next time you access your mail inbox.

When the preview pane is open, the mail message has to be opened. Some viruses or Spyware can exploit this feature.

Deleted Items: When you clean up your Inbox and other folders, you use the "Delete" Button on the toolbar, (red cross). This action simply transfers the mail into the "Deleted Items" folder. Unless you empty this folder on a regular basis, the files will still be there taking up drive space. You can set Outlook Express to automatically delete these files on exiting the program:

- · Open Outlook Express,
- · Left click the "Tools" tab above the toolbar
- · On the drop-down menu, select "Option" right at the bottom
- · From the Options Panel, choose the "maintenance" tab
- On the "Cleaning up messages" panel, tick the box against "Empty Messages from 'Deleted Items Folder" on exit"
- Note the other options for future reference.
- Click "OK" and the files will now be deleted when you exit Outlook Express.

This feature will permanently delete the messages so be sure before you send any mail to the "deleted items" folder.

Receipts: Outlook can be set up to ask for a receipt to be sent from a recipients PC. You might also get messages that ask for a receipt too. To control this function:

- · Open Outlook Express
- Left click the "tools" tab and again select "Options" at the bottom of the dropdown menu
- Select the "Receipts" tab
- Choose the option that you would like from the panel. Tick the box to request
 a receipt or untick not to request. Select the referred Radio Button at the lower
 pane to decide how you deal with receipt requests. I prefer the "Notify Me..."
 Option. Again, click on "Apply" and "OK" to finish.

While you have the "Options" menu open, have a look under the other tabs for Security, Connections, and Signatures etc; to learn a little more about Outlook Express.

Spyware

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To insert a symbol into a Word document

You can use the **Symbol** dialog box to enter symbols that are not on your keyboard,.

- 1. Click where you want to insert the symbol.
- 2. On the **Insert** menu, click **Symbol**, and then click the **Symbols** tab.
- 3. In the **Font** box, click the font that you want.
- 4. Double-click the symbol that you want to insert.
- 5. Click Close.



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Spyware and Adware

Are little annoying programs that find their way onto your computer via your internet surfing. These nasty little programs will watch your surfing habits in order to display relevant advertising to you. They slow down your computer and are about as necessary and helpful as a virus— ie: NOT.

Install Spybot and Adaware. (Or similar protection)

Once installed, use the link in both programs to download the latest updates, then run **Spybot** first. Reboot, then run **Adaware**.

Both programs will recommend that you remove any issues they find, and you should take that advice (they backup what is removed, so it's pretty safe!)

If you're running Windows, you should visit the Windows Update site to get all available patches and updates.

In Outlook, *Ctrl* + *Shift* + *E* creates a new folder. Good for a bit of housekeeping! And while you're at it, you can select a random group of emails by holding down the Ctrl key while you click them. To select a group - click the first email, then Shift + click the last one in the group.

(Windows Key brings up the Start menu without using the mouse).

Email Hoaxes and Net Nasties - How to spot them!

Here are a few tips to help you determine which of the 'too good to be true' emails you should delete. Whatever you do, DON'T forward them to anyone... you'll be adding to the unnecessary email traffic around the globe.

- (1) Does it SOUND feasible? If a Nigerian prince is offering to transfer \$5 million into your bank account and offering to give you some of it, you can safely delete that without worrying you'll miss out on a windfall. It's a hoax.Bill Gates isn't ever going to send you money for forwarding an email to your friends, either. Sorry!
- (2) Is it asking for PERSONAL information? There are lots of very clever emails now that look like they are from eBay,

PayPal or even your own bank asking you to confirm or change your password. Have you received one? It's a hoax.eBay, PayPal and all of the Banks have confirmed that they will NEVER send out requests for your personal information. The best way to check authenticity is to go to your Internet browser, go to the site in question and log in the usual way, checking for any messages from the site itself. NEVER, NEVER, NEVER click a link in an email like this - you'll be taken to a pretend website, lulling you into a false sense of security, where you'll enter your personal details, un-knowingly giving them to a stranger. The link below will help you determine whether the email you've received is a hoax. Do your research before you forward it to anyone.
