After three visits. visitors will be requested to become members.



What?!!




This is my standard way of answering my telephone (if I know who the caller is!)



THIS MONTH'S MEETING - Organising and Locating Files with Anne Leddra

Where is it?

* Do you ever click on the automatic "Save" button and then wonder where the document or image has been saved?



- * Can you tell what a document is all about without first opening it?
- * Do you waste time looking for a saved document/image? It's there somewhere!!.

Anne's presentation will show you how to avoid the frustration and time wasting. There will be hints and tips of how to properly organise your filing system. Some of the subjects covered are:

- * Setting up a filing system
- * Arranging folders/files
- * Naming folders/files
- * Viewing folders/files
- * How to search for a document/file
- * How to handle space wasting duplicates or triplicates
- * Handy shortcuts

We don't always need everything we save on our computers. This session will enable you to at least find what you don't need and deal with it!!

Lionel opened the meeting and thanked all who helped with the Bunnings Sausage Sizzle which was again successful with almost \$1000 profit made.

Lindsay then came to the front to talk about where Windows 10 is today and also gave a brief history of how it came to this time. He said that he has found that laptops purchased with Windows 10 appear to be faster than if you downloaded it onto your existing laptop.

Lindsay has been kind enough to provide us with notes on his talk which includes Windows 10 actions. There are some copies at the front desk for you if you require it. Also a copy of his PowerPoint presentation is available by emailing him at lindsay.chuck@gmail.com.

Updates are now called *feature updates* and are identified by a 4 digit number, eg Anniversary Update = 1607.

You can convert back to your prior build within 10 days of install. Lindsay recommends you do not upgrade straight away as some updates may cause bugs or be bigger than your data allows. He also recommends you enable *Metered Connection* as this will delay the updates. You may receive notifications if you have this on. To enable:

- Start Menu
- Change WiFi settings
- * Advanced Options
- * Enable under *Metered Connection*

If you value your privacy - don't use *express settings*. You will need to go through them all separately. If you use Cortana, you will need to use the default *Privacy settings*.


JIM'S GEMS - From newsletters past

The happiest people don't necessarily have the best of everything, they just make the best of everything they have!

ADJUST THE SIZE OF WHAT'S ON YOUR SCREEN IN WINDOWS 10.

Windows 10 made adjusting the size of items on your display much easier.

A common complaint is that text or other items on the screen are too small to be seen clearly. There have always been ways to adjust the size of items displayed, but they have been somewhat obscure and occasionally something less than reliable. Windows 10 made this a lot easier.



Right click on an empty area of the desktop and click on "Display Settings" in the resulting popup menu.

This will bring up the Settings app, opened to the "Customize your Display" page.

Near the centre of that page is a slider labeled "Change the size of texts, apps and other items: 100% (recommended)", set to some default value.

"Recommended" simply means Windows has determined this setting to be optimal for your display type; items display with the least amount of distortion due to scaling.

Using the left mouse button, click, hold and drag that slider to the right to make things bigger, or to the left to make things smaller. When you release the mouse, most items on the display will resize to your new setting. You can experiment and adjust the size to your taste.

If an app or application doesn't seem to have responded to the change, or appears to be misbehaving after the change, signing out and in again may fix this, or a reboot would do as well.

Depending on your display type, you may find that some things look a little fuzzy. If this happens, you can choose to live with it or try a different setting.

RECOVERY DRIVE

At last month's meeting, Lindsay gave instructions on using a Recovery Drive. This needs to be done prior to PC problems!

If your PC doesn't start, a recovery drive can be used to reset it or troubleshoot a problem This will enable you to reinstall Windows.

- * Get a USB, probably 16 gbs and empty
- * Type "Create recovery drive" in search
- * Select "Create recovery drive"
- * Select "back up system files to recovery drive"
- * Recovery drive creator will determine amount of space you need.
- * Follow instructions from here

IPAD MISBEHAVING



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I am either a very slow learner, or a smart cookie! My iPad was not behaving well: screen freezing, apps not working, email not opening, couldn't get into my photos.

After trying everything to remedy this problem, I remembered Jim saying "If all else fails, turn the computer off for a while". As the iPad has a battery, I couldn't turn it off completely but I did find a **Reset** option in Settings.

I reset all my options and, yes, it worked! My iPad is now behaving as it should but I did have to redo all my settings (restrictions, wallpaper, sounds etc).

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SCAM ALERT

An elaborate scam targeting Australian shoppers has seized upon building excitement over **Amazon's** impending arrival down under.

A scam email doing the rounds claims to be from Amazon offering Australian on-line shoppers a chance to win a \$500 gift voucher, asking them to click on a link and share their views about the on-line retailer.

It says that 80 vouchers are up for grabs. At the top of the email is a disturbingly convincing graphic with the Amazon logo on it, inviting recipients to click and "confirm my voucher".

The link in the email takes you to what looked like a legitimate survey by Amazon but is a fraudulent page aimed at harvesting the personal details of unsuspecting Australians. This approach is called *phishing* and is aimed at stealing money from bank accounts and credit cards.

Always check the sender's email address - scammers often use email addresses containing the name of legitimate companies or banks, but upon close inspection they are different to the institutions actual email address.



QANTAS SCAM ALERT

Another scam email to steer clear of has been doctored to look identical to emails sent by Qantas and offers rewards of cash and frequent flyer points for participating in a survey.

As per the above scam, the scammers are asking you to click on a link and will then seek to steal your personal information. The subject line will read: "Customer Satisfaction Survey, Earn up to 95 AUD Plus 1,000 bonus Qantas points."

Delete both of these emails immediately!

GMAIL WILL STOP SUPPORT FOR OLDER VERSIONS OF CHROME BROWSER



Early December is the expected date for users of 53 and older additions of Chrome, including V49

which is the last version to support Windows XP and Vista, to stop working. Users will be redirected to a basic HTML small version of Gmail.

Affected users will start seeing a banner at the top of their Gmail advising them to upgrade to an up to date version of Chrome.

WIFI ON AUSTRALIAN PLANES

Qantas has announced WiFi will be available on its 737 and Airbus A330 from late February.

Virgin is expected to follow later in 2017.

A number of international airlines already offer WiFi, including Emirates, Garuda and Singapore Airlines.

APPLE TO STOP SUPPORTING 32 BIT APPS

Apple has updated the pop-up warning in iOS 10.3 beta to say the 32 bit app you are running will not work in future versions of iOS. This means older iOS devices built on 32 bit architecture will not be able to upgrade to the new iOS. Eg the iPhone 5C and older iPhones and the standard version of the iPad and the first iPad mini.

Apple has rejected 32 bit apps from its app store since June 2015. If you use a 32 bit app on a later device you will need to upgrade the app to a 64 bit app.

What can you do if you have favourite games in 32 bit that you don't want to lose?

- 1) Manually download your favourite apps. You can back up the IPA files in iTunes to an external drive.
- Consider purchasing a second hand device to use specifically for the task to play old games. This device should run iOS 10.
- 3) Avoid going online





5 ways to protect yourself from ATM fraud?

OverSixty.com give five simple measures you can take to protect your money.

Be on the lookout for spy cameras - Most ATM scams consist of two parts, one that steals data from your card and the other that obtains your pin

number, often through the use of a hidden camera. If you notice any objects in and around the ATM, cover your hand when entering your pin. If you think there's one around, may be use another ATM.

Be aware of signs of shoddy workmanship - Banks are generally pretty good with the maintenance and upkeep of their ATM's so if you see any signs of shoddy workmanship including off-colour plastic or inconsistent details, it could be a sign that this particular machine has been compromised. Before inserting your card, have a quick look around the machine for anything that feels a little off colour. If it doesn't seem right, it's best to take your card somewhere else.

Keep your eye on suspicious characters around the ATM - Often fraudsters are not working alone, so if you are withdrawing from an ATM you're not familiar with, be on the lookout for any suspicious characters lurking around. They may be in cahoots with the fraudsters who are looking to swipe your personal details.

Pay attention to the card slot - If anything seems a little odd about the card slot of the ATM, such as an irregular protrusion or inconsistent design, it is important to be wary of this. Fake card readers are often installed over the original slot of regular ATM's to capture your private information.

Pay attention to how the PIN pad feels - If the PIN pad feels loose, thick or spongy, that's not a good sign. Many fraudsters use a pin-pad overlay technique to capture and record people's personal details. As with some of the other steps in the list, if it doesn't feel

right, you are best going to another ATM.

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
