AGM REPORT



New members (**June Harman** and **Dean Howard**) were unanimously elected and welcomed to the committee.




The AGM closed at 8.40 pm and coffee/tea, supper and a chat was enjoyed by all. Thanks to everyone for bringing a plate of supper to share.

COMMITTEE CAPERS




The November committee meeting was held on Monday 10th with just 2 members missing (they are on holidays!)

4 WAYS TO CLEAR SPACE ON YOUR SMARTPHONE

If you've been hit with the pesky "low on space" message from your phone, here are four tricks to freeing up space and getting the most out of your device.



1. Check your usage

Check which apps are taking the most space on your phone as there are usually some surprise hogs.

For Apple: Go to Settings > General > Usage > Manage Storage.

At the top you'll see how much space you've used and how much is available. Below you'll have a more detailed analysis with a list of apps ranked by how much space they are using.

For Android: Go to Settings > SD & phone storage > Internal phone storage > Manage Storage.

2. Delete unused apps

Don't keep apps that you don't use. Every app takes up storage space and runs some kind of background process, which all combines to slow down your phone's performance.

Game apps, which use high quality graphics, can surprisingly take up a lot of space so delete the ones you can't see yourself using anymore. You can always re-download if you find you need them.

3. Remove old podcasts and videos

Podcasts and videos take up a lot of space on phones. If you've uploaded your videos onto your computer (or another back-up) and don't need them on your phone anymore, then delete them. Videos are one of the biggest space hogs.

4. Use a cloud system to back up photos

The hundreds of photos on our phones can take up quite a sizeable chunk on phone storage. But if you don't want to take them off your phone, the good news is you don't have to. [Save space and back-up photos by using a cloud storage system such as Dropbox.](#) Your photos will be accessible on the web so you can easily search them up or alternatively many cloud systems have an app to download, where you can quickly access them.

SCAM ALERT

We are going to try to keep you all up to date with the latest scams. Even though we know you are all becoming cautious and aware of scams out there, the scams are looking more and more authentic.

Scamwatch is warning Australian gamblers to be aware and are issuing an alert that confidence tricksters are on the hunt for victims, especially during the Spring Racing Season. Scammers are offering software packages or syndicate betting with guaranteed returns when you follow their system for placing bets.



They will use high pressure sales tactics as claiming that places are strictly limited or they may even claim their system is safe because it is backed by government regulations. Participation requires the payment of large upfront fees for software or access to so-called expert advice. Betting syndicates may also require the use of a sports betting account which cannot be accessed and will soon disappear along with the scammers.

If you receive a phone call, email or glossy brochure out of the blue, delete or bin it. Always get independent financial or legal advice if an offer involves a significant amount of money. If you think you have provided your account number to a scammer, contact your bank immediately.



Bib and Bub are still receiving scams that look like they are from AGL and Telstra. DO NOT click on the links provided, otherwise you will be taking your computer down to IT&C for costly repairs.

Also, vouchers and chances to win money supposedly from Aldi, Woolworths, Coles, Myer etc, etc. are still circulating. Beware of these too.

ADDING A CONTACT LIST - in Outlook.com

Do you send jokes or documents to groups of friends/family? Setting up a *group or contact list* isn't very clear. I handled it this way:

Use your browser, ie Chrome/firefox. I used Google to search for Outlook.com.

Log in and once logged in:

Click the 9 dot icon at top left of screen

Click PEOPLE icon.

Click down arrow next to NEW.

Click Contact list.

Type in name for your contact list.

Type first letter of contact name.

Select name and click.

Then Repeat. Then SAVE.

To add a new contact to contact list: select contact list name; click on EDIT then Click in Add Members box and as above.

SYNCHRONISE YOUR GOOGLE CALENDAR & CONTACTS WITH WINDOWS 10

A question received by Lindsay during the month asked how to synchronise your iCloud Calendar and Contacts with your Windows 10 desktop. He thought other people may also be interested in this subject and has provided a few comments. If you have an iPhone or iPad, watching the you-tube clip at

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rsR_LodTZt8

will help you achieve the task.

Before you jump in and start syncing contacts/calendars/email, consider how concerned you are about privacy? With the introduction of Windows 10 this has been a hot topic. Watching the above video will also assist you with syncing your Google Calendar & Contacts with W10. Lindsay discovered the video after syncing his gmail/calendar/contacts, and has since stopped syncing his contacts and gmail. He prefers accessing his gmail via the Chrome browser because of the email format it provides.

One feature he likes about the W10 calendar app is the year display. It may not be a feature everyone appreciates, but certainly can be helpful when planning six months ahead,

Google doesn't appear to have this feature. There is also the ability to have more than one calendar and when he imported his Google calendar, the result was two calendars.

This is important to note, because if you don't enter the event in the correct calendar, it won't sync to the calendar on your other device.

Lindsay says the explanation in the video is very easy to follow, however, if you have some feedback, he would love to know.

The best way to clean W10.

Two methods for cleaning Windows 10.

1. Typing **Disk Cleanup** in the **Start** menu. Most items can be removed but hold off cleaning **Windows ESD installation files and exclude any category you aren't sure about.** Click **Clean system files** first to view everything that can be removed.
2. **CCleaner** is the best option. It cleans more applications than the built-in Windows tool but **untick the options for cleaning the registry.**

CCleaner is free and can be downloaded over the internet.

GOODREADER for iOS

This is an app you have to pay for. Comments are it is excellent as a PDF reader for text books and software manuals. Quick to upload, pages are clear to read and it is easier to use than a kindle.



Computer experts and tech-savvy users have long lamented the absurdity of teaching people to use passwords that are hard for

humans to use but easy for computers to guess. But relief is in sight with the rise of the passphrase - a new password standard that champions length over complexity.

Rather than requiring passwords to include capital letters and special symbols - like so: !f33dM3! - passphrases require more characters, usually between 16 and 64 (like this: [nooneunderstandshowmuchilovebacon](#)).

New research from Carnegie Mellon University is the latest to confirm that passphrases make excellent passwords for two reasons. Firstly, length is almost as good as randomness at resisting hacking attacks. And, secondly, words and phrases are far easier for humans to remember.

Cyber security expert Matthew Warren, professor of information systems at Deakin University, said traditional passwords were more susceptible to "brute force" cracking programs. Brute force attacks systematically test every possible combination of letters, numbers and symbols until they find the one that works. It's akin to trial-and-error on steroids, which is why length matters: longer passwords are exponentially more difficult to crack.

"People are bad at remembering [complex passwords] and also, people are lazy. So they might remember one complex password but then they use that one password for every account," he said. "Users go for the path of least resistance."



Earlier this year, the National Institute for Standards and Technology in the US, which oversees government computer policy, recommended overhauling passwords and abandoning the practice of forcing users to change their passwords regularly.

The trick with passphrases is to avoid popular or common phrases, such as song lyrics or idioms.

Michelle Mazurek, one of the Carnegie Mellon University researchers now at the University of Maryland College Park, recommended users test potential passphrases by typing the first part into Google and seeing if the search engine auto-completes it.

Of course, the passphrase also has disadvantages, Professor Warren said. Again, it comes down to human error. "Many password authentication systems... only accept typed passwords, so there's a greater chance of people making a typing mistake when entering a long phrase of text."

Nevertheless, there are stirrings of change among government agencies and businesses overseas, which are increasingly likely to allow longer passwords.

"Once it's been adopted in America or Europe, the rest of the world starts to use it," Professor Warren said.
