Tea, coffee and a biscuit or two after the meeting was accompanied by much chatter.

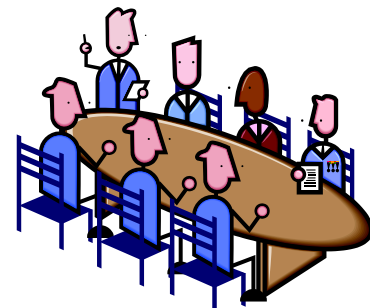

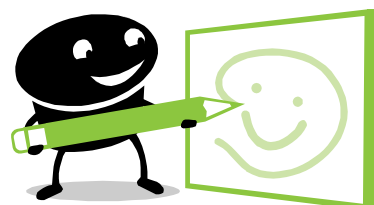
## COMMITTEE CAPERS

## ANSWERS FROM OUR Q & A NIGHT

### ***Q1 We have an Epson wireless printer but why does our computer ask for a cable connection to scan documents?***

Hard wire the scanner to the computer i.e. Via Ethernet or USB.

Try again—check if it works that way.

If not, completely uninstall program, turn computer off. Then reinstall.

Do not plug USB or Ethernet into the computer until requested by the install program.

Once operating, the program can be modified for Wi-Fi.

THOUGHT! Maybe the printer driver is for XP and needs to be updated for later Windows version.

### ***Q2 How do you put signatures onto your computer documents?***

Make a hard copy of your signature.

Scan the document, name and save it (in a suitable folder) to your hard drive.

Remember in which folder you put it and where to find that folder again!

Have your electronic document open. Navigate to where you want to insert the signature. Go to “Insert”, navigate to the folder holding your signature, select and hit OK. Signature will appear in the document.

You may need to select “layout” to insert this. Right click signature, select “picture” the “layout” and hit “tight” and “OK” You will then be able to manoeuvre your signature to where you want it—and decide how big you want it.

### ***Q3 Can a Samsung tablet use Telstra for the internet? We are using gmail but would like to be on Telstra.***

The short answer is yes. However, gmail is webmail and requires an Internet Service Provider to connect to the internet. Telstra is an ISP. Using Telstra will require an account and may require a device like a pocket Wi-Fi to connect to the internet. Suggest speaking with a committee member about your circumstances before proceeding.

### ***Q4 What is Cortana on Windows 10?***

Cortana is a voice-activated personal assistant. Think of it as Siri, (Apple’s talking assistant), but for Windows. You can use it to get weather forecasts, set reminders, tell you jokes, send email, find files, search the Internet and so on. It is available with Windows 10.

### ***Q5 How to use Trove?***

The first question may be: **Why** does one want to use Trove?

Trove is a multi-million dollar exercise by the National Library of Australia to digitise all newspapers around Australia from our earliest times to immortalise the newspaper records of our country. So, it is basically a genealogy program.

**To use Trove:** Go to Google and type <http://trove.nia.gov.au/>

There are many categories to search on. The main ones are the digital newspapers.

**Q6 Working with photography—get into and find the right pictures.**



1. Set correct date and time on the digital camera (This will allow sorting and sequencing at any later stage).
2. Set up filing system in pictures library (This can be based on events or chronology). E.g. each day during a holiday.
3. Create a filing system the **YOU** understand—i.e. if alphabetic sequence suits you, do it that way, or if chronological or event sequence suits then that is the way to go.
4. File the photographs regularly instead of facing a mountain of photos to sort and file.
5. Prepare your filing system before you take the photos—that way you will know where to put your photos in the first place.

**Golden Rule:** If you don't know where you put the photos, how will you know where to find them!!! The secret is rule 5.

**Q7 Windows 10 pictures. When I right click to get menu up, the whole lot disappears and computer goes back to standby screen. Is there a simple way or any way of fixing it?**

The demonstration indicates this might be an individual enquiry that will require individual attention.

**Q8 How difficult is it to follow instructions on Google?**

Firstly, if you have problems reading the specific answer on Google,

**PRINT IT OUT**

If necessary, use 'Snipping Tool' to select the part of the question for which you required answers - or - print selected page - or - highlight part and then print selected area - or - paste into Word and save.

**Q9 Using Microsoft Outlook. Emails that return for various reasons. Some still come through after many months. Address deleted from Address book. How can I stop these returned emails from continuing/permanently remove?**

The error message on the returned email should give you an indication as to why the email has bounced. I suggest you create a rule in Outlook to automatically direct it to junk. The mail server will send the email numerous times but will eventually stop. Unless you have access to the mail server to delete the email there is little you can do.

**Q10 Picsizer or free photo sizing tool rather than through email.**

Download and install Picsizer onto your computer. Select appropriate parameters and options.

Reason to use Picsizer—easy reduction of image size.

E.g. Movie Maker, Power Point, Word and others will fail if there are too many large picture files open. Picsizer allows simple picture size reduction in folders allowing much better control on the above programs. See Jim for the Picsizer program.

### Q11 What is a browser extension?

Wikipedia gives the following definitions—Google **Chrome Extensions** are **browser extensions** that modify the Google **Chrome browser**. These **extensions** are written using web technologies like HTML, JavaScript and CSS. Google **Chrome Extensions** are downloadable through the **Chrome Web Store** (formerly the Google **Chrome Extensions** Gallery). If you haven't tried them they may save you time.

See Google. What are the risks of using extensions?

Browser extensions are pieces of code that run in your web browser. They can do malicious things like display ads, track your browsing and capture your passwords and private data. A safe extension could automatically update and become malware.

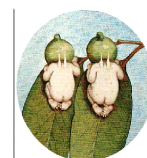


### Q12 Should I turn my router off when I'm not using my computer?

This question was put to an ISP and the answer was no. However the device is not damaged by turning it off. Turning your router off will, like turning other electrical appliances off, save electricity. By leaving your router on you should ensure your network is secure, and if you leave your computer on 24/7, this increases the risk of being hacked.

## MANAGING YOUR DIGITAL RECORDS - from Lindsay with thanks.

### Name your files properly :

- Be descriptive but keep it short.
- Leave out spaces, use full stops, capital letters, underscores.
- Consider adding a consisted date format ie. YYYYMMDD

### Control & organise your digital records:

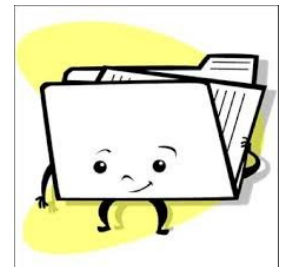
- Consider a simple folder structure.
- Name digital object meaningfully but succinctly.
- Review your digital records at regular intervals and delete those that don't have a permanent value.

### Manage your emails:

- Review regularly and delete emails of a temporary value or you're not sure of.
- Control emails of permanent value using a folder structure and identify subject, function or activity.
- Add a meaningful subject to every email.
- Email in a string or conversation rather than creating a new message. (Delete earlier copies of the string).

### Backup

- Theft, natural disaster, accidental deletion, hard drive failure or a coffee spill can mean bad news for your digital photos, emails and documents.

## A Visit to the Northern Computer Group.

A few committee members visited this energetic club on Tuesday 30th August. They call themselves, OCC, or Our Computer Club, and have a membership of from 15 to 20 who are all retired. They have a very small committee of President, Secretary and Treasurer.

At first I thought that the meeting was to be much more formal than our monthly meetings, with Apologies and Minutes being tabled, however, after receiving a very warm welcome things changed. Their minutes are on their web site, on a computer screen operated by Elwin Scriven, their "computer guru". He had difficulty opening their emails after having changed the password last week, and it took some time for him to present the minutes. We felt quite happy that they have technical problems too.

The meeting then took on a workshop feeling, with spontaneous questions being asked and answered, and experiences shared while some members used their laptops.

Elwin suggested, if possible, to watch an SBS program (22.8.16) now on YouTube, called Defeating the Hackers.

He explained that secure websites had an 's' after 'http,' and to check the address on the status bar at the bottom to see if it looked genuine.

Elwin showed mixed graphic files that he has accumulated over many years. In fact the graphics numbered over 79,000, with files having a number of topics as well as quick reference guides for many Microsoft office programs like *Windows 10 for Dummies*, *Adobe Digital Editions* for e-readers together with a companion program *Calibre*.

He explained how to use a Host file to block bad websites, and advised never to do banking using free Wi-Fi.

There was a 'Show & Tell' segment promoting new or handy 'gadgets' or 'add-ons' like speakers, a wireless extender, a 2-port USB switch and a screen cleaning kit, and one member showed off his new \$300 FitBit watch that is a mini computer and does amazing things.

3 pm sharp - Afternoon Tea. Once a month they have a special spread with a birthday cake - we timed it right!



More examples of programs followed - one to read "mobi" files, a safe download called "Ninite.com" to keep all your programs and apps automatically updated and many more.

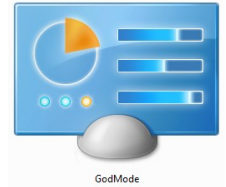
Elwin gave us a copy of 'today's disc', so, when time permits, we'll be able to access the disc and pass on some of his hints. He makes one each week for their members. We had a great time.



## **GOD-MODE**

The week we attended the **OCC Computer Club**, they gave a couple of useful tips in getting around your computer.

One of these was a thing called “**God-Mode**”, whereby each and every icon under “Control Panel” can be expanded out to display all the sub topics under each main Control Panel icon. This is done by creating a new folder on the desktop: renaming it (by pasting in a specific piece of code from developers) then hitting the “enter” button.



It is quite remarkable that when one now double clicks on the newly created folder, a full and total list of all actions available in Control Panel are up on screen - basically in a Windows Explorer style Window.

To enable the hidden feature for Windows 7, 8 and 10, here's what you need to do:

**Step 1** - Right click on your desktop and make a new folder. For the folder's name, paste the string given below:

GodMode.{ED7BA470-8E54-465E-825C-99712043E01C}

Do not forget to insert the period after “GodMode.” You can also alter the name of the folder (even though the string is called GodMode). To do so, simply alter the “GodMode” part of the string to the name you want.

**Step 2** - Once you have inserted the string, hit Enter and the icon will resemble the Control Panel.

**Step 3** - Open the folder to see the available customization options/configuration settings at your disposal. It is pretty easy to shift around GodMode on your system the same manner in which you can shift any traditional folder.

In the even you change your mind and want to remove the customization, just click on the GodMode icon on your sytem and simple delete it. Re-enabling it is easy too and can be done using any of the above mentioned steps.

Other customisation is possible by googling “God-Mode” on the net.
