



Why Use Firefox Instead of Other Browsers?

There are many options for web browsers out there, but after trying several, there is only one I would recommend. There are many reasons as to why use Firefox instead of other browsers. I have created a list that details just a few of the answers the question: Why use Firefox instead?

1 Faster Browsing

Firefox is open source, so it is available for any programs to develop it for themselves and for all of us. That means Firefox has become the fastest browser available.

2 Tabbed Browsing

Having multiple windows open at once makes browsing annoying and confusing. Firefox has tabbed browsing, so you can open links in background tabs and read them when you're ready. Imagine surfing YouTube videos and being able to open five at once in separate tabs to let them load while you watch one. Then, just click on the next tab and your next video is ready to watch. To open a new tab, you just have to hold Ctrl while clicking a link.

3 Integrated Search Engine

[Firefox](#) comes with Google built in to the browser itself so that you don't have to open a Google search page. It takes up very little space on the toolbar and is extremely easy to use. With just a click, you can use that same search box to search Yahoo, Amazon, Ebay, Wikipedia, and almost any other site you use.

4 Popup Blocker

I set out to test Firefox's popup blocking capabilities by visiting a popup blocker test page. Firefox was able to close all 200 popups. For sites that you need to see popup windows, you can easily access the list of websites that the Firefox will allow.

5 Security

Most malicious plugins that bug your computer with viruses and malware are programmed for Internet Explorer. Firefox spares you the crashes and slow performance other browsers fail to protect you from.

6 Download Manager

Firefox's download manager allows you to control your downloads in a more streamlined fashion. For example, you can pause your download and continue it at a later time. The download manager also stores download information like size and location. It also gives a small notification at the lower right side of your screen after your download is complete.

7 Blocking Images

When visiting a site full of ads, your surfing is not only slower, but it is also very annoying. Firefox allows you the option to disable images on any pages you wish, preventing your browsing from slowing down. You can then unblock images with just a click.

8 Cleaner Interface

[Firefox](#) is not filled with clutter and buttons that take up space and make the browser look messy. It dedicates 4% more of its space to actual web pages than Internet Explorer does.

9 Page Previewing

When you right click on a page and select "page info" you can see a window that displays vast amounts of information about the web page including general information as well as all the links the page contains.

10 Less Hard Drive Space

Firefox is almost half the size of Internet Explorer which means that it takes less time to download and it takes up less of that precious space on your hard drive. That means your computer as a whole will run faster.

Recommendation

I have found Firefox to be the best browser available. Downloading Firefox is free and fast and will make your browsing experience smoother and more streamlined. !

Word 2003 Tips

Keyboard short cuts

Ctrl+U: Standard underline

Ctrl+Shift+D: Double underline

Ctrl+Shift+W: Word underline

Insert Date and Time

To insert the date and time into a Word 2003 document, there's no need to type it in. Just select "Insert" then "Date and Time" where you want this information to be in your current document. When the "Date and Time" dialog appears, choose the date or time format you want, then press "OK".

One other nice feature is that on this dialog, you can check "Update automatically". This way, every time you open and resave the document, the date and/or time are automatically changed to the current date and/or time.

Shift-Spacebar (page up)

Ctrl+= (increase text size)

Ctrl+- (decrease text size)

Ctrl-W (close tab)

F5 (reload)

1. Right-click and choose "Font".
2. When the "Font" multi-tabbed dialog box appears, click the "Text Effects" tab.
3. Now, choose from a variety of effects for your text:
 - * Blinking Background
 - * Las Vegas Lights
 - * Marching Black Ants
 - * Marching Red Ants
 - * Shimmer
 - * Sparkle Text
4. Click "OK" to close the

Microsoft plans to discontinue sales of Windows XP on new computers on June 30, completing the company's transition to Windows Vista. The end of the XP era was originally planned for late 2007, but Microsoft gave its old operating system a stay of execution after listening to feedback from consumers and industry partners.

InfoWorld, a technology industry publication, is hosting a petition that allows consumers to pledge their support for Windows XP being sold beyond June. At press, more than 111,000 people have signed it.

Microsoft will continue providing tech support for XP through April 2009 and security updates through 2014. The significance of the June 30 deadline is that anyone purchasing a machine from Dell, HP or any other major manufacturer will be forced to adopt Windows Vista as the operating system.

I assure you, it won't hurt.

It's frustrating to read other technology columnists and magazines recommending that consumers keep installing XP on their new machines. XP was released in October 2001. As a point of reference, the original iPod was released in the same month.

The first generation iPod had 5 gigabytes of storage, a black-and-white video screen and was as thick as a pack of cigarettes. Today, it's much thinner and has 160GB of storage. Or, you can buy the more advanced iPhone.

The amount of innovation between Vista and XP is no less. Vista introduced improved search and browsing support in the Windows shell, improved stability and sidebar Gadgets. More important than the superficial updates, Vista is a more secure system than XP, which can help reduce malware and viruses.

Vista is the foundation for the future of Windows-based computing. Recommending to someone purchasing a new computer, one that he plans to use for the next three to five years, to install XP is irresponsible.

One of the main arguments against Vista is its speed compared with XP. Most PCs shipping today are built with a minimum of 1GB of memory and a graphics card capable of running all the bells and whistles offered by Vista. XP will run faster on these machines, but only because it was designed for machines running on 2001 hardware. Pentium 4, anyone?

Others argue that Vista isn't compatible with all printers and third-party accessories purchased in the past decade. Look at it as an opportunity to upgrade your antiquated hardware with the latest offerings.

If you're still using a peripheral that doesn't connect via USB, it's time to send it to the recycling center. For those who remember, the jump from Windows 3.1 to Windows 95 was just as substantial. We all survived then, and I promise we will get through Vista together.

Vista is not without its flaws, but it's not the worst operating system Microsoft has ever released (I'm looking at you, Windows Millennium).

Word 2003 Tip

Raise or Lower Text

Summary: For emphasis, you can raise or lower blocks of text in your Word 2003 documents.
For emphasis, you may wish to raise or lower certain text inside your [Microsoft Word 2003](#) documents. While you can raise whole blocks of text, it may make sense to raise or lower certain words or phrases inside a paragraph.

1. Highlight the word(s) you want to raise or lower.
 2. Select the "Format" - "Font" menu or right-click the text and choose "Font".
 3. When the "Font" multi-tabbed dialog box appears, click the "Text Effects" tab.
 4. Next to "Position", click the combo box and select either "Normal", "Raised", or "Lowered".
 5. If you selected "Raised" or "Lowered", next to "By", enter the number of points (or your configured measurement unit) that you want the text raised or lowered.
 6. When done, click "OK" to close the dialog box.
